Graeme Innes AM

Graeme Innes has been Australia's Disability Discrimination Commissioner since December 2005 and appointed Race Discrimination Commissioner in July 2009. Prior to taking on the role of Race Discrimination Commissioner, Graeme spent three

and a half years as Human Rights Commissioner. Graeme has been a member of the NSW Administrative Decisions Tribunal, the NSW Consumer, Trader and Tenancy Tribunal and the Social Security Appeals Tribunal as well as Hearing Commissioner with the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission. Graeme was Chair of the Disability Advisory Council of Australia, and the first Chair of Vision Australia.



Kym Peake

Kym Peake joined Skills Victoria as Deputy Secretary in early 2010. Prior to this, Kym worked in the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet for 18 months as the Executive Coordinator, Productivity and Inclusion and as Senior Departmental Advisor,

Policy Liaison to the Prime Minister's Office. Kym has extensive experience working at a State and Commonwealth level, leading complex policy, legislation and service delivery reforms. In Victoria, Kym led reforms for at risk children and families. Kym also headed up a public sector governance practice at KPMG advising governments on range of governance and strategy issues.



The Hon. Michael Kirby AC CMG

When he retired from the High Court of Australia on 2 February 2009, Michael Kirby was Australia's longest serving judge. He was first appointed in 1975 as a Deputy President of the Australian Conciliation & Arbitration Commission. Soon after, he was

seconded as inaugural Chairman of the Australian Law Reform Commission (1975-84) and served thirteen years on the High Court of Australia. Michael has also served on three university governing bodies, on many national and international bodies. Amongst the latter have been service as a member of the World Health Organisation's Global Commission on AIDS; President of the International Commission of Jurists, Geneva; as UN Special Representative Human Rights in Cambodia; a member of the UNESCO International Bioethics Committee; a member of the High Commissioner for Human Rights' Judicial Reference Group (2007-) and a member of the UNAIDS Reference Group on HIV and Human Rights(2004-).

Following his judicial retirement, Michael Kirby was elected President of the Institute of Arbitrators & Mediators Australia from 2009-2010. He serves as a Board Member of the Australian Centre for International Commercial Arbitration. In 2010, he was awarded the Gruber Justice Prize. He is also presently a member of the Eminent Persons Group which is investigating the future of the Commonwealth of Nations.



Mary O'Kane

Professor Mary O'Kane is the NSW Chief Scientist and Scientific Engineer and also Executive Chairman of Mary O'Kane & Associates Pty Ltd, providing advice to governments, universities and the private sector. She is Chair of the Australian

Centre for Renewable Energy, Chair of the Development Gateway and the Development Gateway International, Chair of the CRC for Spatial Information, a director of PSMA Ltd, Business Events Sydney, and the Australian Business Foundation. She is Fellow and Vice-President of the Academy of Technological Sciences and Engineering and Fellow of Engineers Australia.

Professor O'Kane was Vice-Chancellor of the University of Adelaide, and is a former member of the Australian Research Council, the Co-operative Research Centres (CRC) Committee and the board of the CSIRO. She was a member of the Panel reviewing the National Innovation System in 2008 (the Cutler Review), and is a member of the NSW Innovation Council.



Catherine Scarth

Cath Scarth is General Manager Community and Policy at AMES. She has over 20 years experience in designing, implementing and evaluating a wide range of innovative social programs and enterprises both in Australia and

England. Cath spent 15 years at the Brotherhood of St Laurence leading the development and delivery of a number of award winning, innovative community services and social enterprises. At AMES, Cath Scarth continues to seek innovative ways to partner with employers, Government and the community sector to achieve positive employment and settlement outcomes for newly arrived migrants and refugees. She is also involved in the broader development of social enterprises.

Fiona Knowles is the Manager of Learning and Development (School for Sustainable Futures) with Swinburne University of Technology (TAFE Division). She has works closely with Industry to develop innovative training delivery models to

help develop the skills of their workforce. Owen Downie
